## STATEMENT OF THE CASE

Petitioner brings this appeal from the decision of the Salt Lake County Board of Equalization. This matter was argued in an Initial Hearing on June 26, 2006.

# APPLICABLE LAW

All tangible taxable property shall be assessed and taxed at a uniform and equal rate on the basis of its fair market value, as valued on January 1, unless otherwise provide by law. (Utah Code Ann. Sec. 59-2-103 (1).)

"Fair market value" means the amount at which property would change hands between a willing buyer and a willing seller, neither being under any compulsion to buy or sell and both having reasonable knowledge of the relevant facts. (Utah Code Ann. 59-2-102(11).)

Any person dissatisfied with the decision of the county board of equalization concerning the assessment and equalization of any property, or the determination of any exemption in which the person has an interest, may appeal that decision to the commission by filing a notice of appeal specifying the grounds for the appeal with the county auditor within 30 days after the final action of the county board. . . (Utah Code Ann. Sec. 59-2-1006(1).)

To prevail in a real property tax dispute, the Petitioner must (1) demonstrate that the County's original assessment contained error, and (2) provide the Commission with a sound evidentiary basis for reducing the original valuation to the amount proposed by Petitioner. *Nelson V. Bd. Of Equalization of Salt Lake County*, 943 P.2d 1354 (Utah 1997).

#### DISCUSSION

Petitioner is appealing the market value of the subject property as set by Respondent for property tax purposes. The lien date at issue in this matter is January 1, 2005. The subject property is parcel no. ####, located at ADDRESS in CITY, Utah. The County Assessor had set the value of the subject property, as of the lien date at \$\$\$\$. The County Board of Equalization sustained the value. Petitioner requests that the value be reduced to \$\$\$\$\$. Respondent requests that the value set by the County Board of Equalization be sustained.

The subject property consists of a .22-acre lot improved with a Cottage/Bungalow style residence. The residence was 69 years old. It has 1058 square feet above grade and 529 basement square feet of which none are finished. There is also a detached two-car garage measuring 18 feet by 36 feet. The County considered the residence to be in good condition. The residence has siding that appears to be aluminum or vinyl.

Petitioner has the burden of proof in this matter and must demonstrate not only an error in the valuation set by the County Board of Equalization, but also provide an evidentiary basis to support a new value. In this matter Petitioner provided evidence of the sales of five

comparable sales. The Petitioner's comparable sales are all close to the same east-west coordinate as the subject property but all are south of the subject. Two are between STREET 1 and STREET 2 and the other three are between STREET 2 and STREET 3. The sales of the comparable properties occurred between October 2004 and March 2005 with selling prices ranging between \$\$\$\$\$ and \$\$\$\$.

REPRESENTATIVE 2. It was the appraiser's conclusion that the value for the subject property as of the lien date at issue was \$\$\$\$\$. The appraiser arrived at this value through a market approach by reviewing three comparable properties. The county's comparable sales are all at or north of STREET 1. The appraiser made what appear to be appropriate adjustments for differences in various factors such as home square footage, lot size, and garage size. After adjustment, the appraiser valued the three comparable properties at \$\$\$\$\$, \$\$\$\$, and \$\$\$\$\$.

Reviewing the comparable properties and their differing values, the Commission finds that the county's comparables more adequately approximate the value of the subject property. On this basis, the Commission finds that the Petitioner has not shown any error in the value as established by the Board of Equalization and supported by the county's appraisal.

### **DECISION AND ORDER**

Based upon the foregoing, the Tax Commission finds that the value of the subject property as of January 1, 2005 is \$\$\$\$\$. It is so ordered.

This Decision does not limit a party's right to a Formal Hearing. Any party to this case may file a written request within thirty (30) days of the date of this decision to proceed to a Formal Hearing.
